Safeguarding Children at Corby Old Village Primary School

Statutory requirements

Working Together to Safeguard Children (HM Government 2016) requires all schools to follow the procedures for protecting children from abuse which are established by the Northamptonshire Safeguarding Children Board.

Keeping Children Safe In Education (DfE 2015) places several responsibilities on all schools, these include:

- ◆ Appointing Designated Safeguarding Leads and providing them with the recognised additional training they need to provide support and guidance to all staff and members of the school community on safeguarding. DSL's are also responsible for liaising with other agencies involved in safeguarding.
- ◆ Ensuring all staff are trained in safeguarding and understand their responsibilities in this area.
- ◆ Have robust reporting systems that are effective.
- ◆ Work with other agencies as needed to ensure children's safety, including the sharing of information where there is a genuine need to do so.
- ◆ To guarantee that effective and secure e-safety procedures are in place.
- ◆ To provide a secure and safe environment for children to learn in.

Corby Old Village Primary School will:

- ◆ Establish and maintain an environment where children feel secure, are encouraged to talk and are listened to when they have a worry or concern.
- ◆ Include within the PSHE and Computing curriculum, opportunities for children to recognise and stay safe from potential risks.
- ◆ Establish and maintain an environment where school staff and volunteers feel safe, are encouraged to talk and are listened to when they have concerns about the safety and wellbeing of a child.
- ◆ Ensure children know that there are adults in the school whom they can approach if they are worried.
- ◆ Record incidents of abuse, in line with statutory requirements, taking advice from MASH as needed.
- ◆ Undertake appropriate discussion with parents prior to involvement of another agency, unless to do so would place the child at further risk of harm.
- ◆ Work in partnership with other agencies to implement child protection; child in need or Early Help Assessments if and when they are needed.

As parents, you can help by:

- ◆ Listening carefully to your children and letting us know of any concerns as soon as possible.
- ◆ Reinforcing safeguarding and online safety messages at home.
- ◆ Following the school routines and requirements that support safeguarding.
- ◆ Being aware of the different types of abuse children can suffer: -
 - ◇ Physical abuse
 - ◇ Emotional abuse
 - ◇ Sexual abuse
 - ◇ Neglect
